

Jerry Davidson led the children on a hike to Selfridge Park. Jake and Zack Mills and others helped supervise the children at the park.



# What Breaks Your Heart?







Approximately 60 people attended this unique worship service and art exhibit. When Green Lake High School art teacher, Leslie Wood, gave her 14 Green Lake High School students an assignment a few months ago, little did she know it would create such a response. You may have read or heard about the art assignment: "What Breaks Your Heart?" The result was an art exhibit that "challenged audience perceptions and ignited conversations about what creative expression is all about" (Kristin Radtke writing for the "Green Lake Reporter"). Subjects of the art ranged from immigration, Parkland H.S. shooting, and domestic violence to wildlife poaching.

After PLUUF member Judy Harris read about the controversial artwork in the Ripon & Berlin papers, she suggested we exhibit the work at PLUUF and invite Artist Pat Dobrinska to point out the finer details of the paintings. She also invited psychologist Joe Hatcher to touch on the emotional response to the paintings. Tim Lyke of the Ripon Commonwealth Press attended the event and in an e-mail wrote, "I was impressed with the entire service: the relaxed, informality yet seriousness of purpose and readings. The questions following the presentations were terrific and I'm sure we could have gone another hour had time permitted."
