February RE will celebrate the achievements of black Americans with emphasis on Harriet Tubman, Martin Luther King, Jr. and wife Coretta Scott King.







The speaker who shared this information suggested "The Post" was worth seeing.

Worship Service January 14 with Ellen Mueller Making a Case for Compassion Towards Undocumented Immigrants

Why do we have over 10 million undocumented immigrants here and why didn't they just follow our laws and come here legally? For the residents of more than 20 countries, there is no legal route into the United States unless an individual has a close family member already here or is highly educated with specialized skills that an employer is requesting. Asylum seekers, if allowed into the country, are often returned to


their country of origin after a review. With no qualifying family member in the USA, lacking the education and skills desired, and no case for asylum, illegal entry is the only route. Desperate to be here, individuals crossing through Mexico face the possibility of death, and for women, a 60-80% chance of being raped. Once here, undocumented immigrants are GOOD for our economy according to 44 of 46 economists interviewed for a Wall Street Journal Report. Unable to obtain a valid social security number, they are forced to use a false SSN or a taxpayer identification number. Thus, three out of four pay taxes but are unable to collect social security, SSI, or use Medicaid, housing subsidies, etc. They take jobs that need to be done but that others do not want to do.

Ellen shared her personal story of obtaining proof of citizenship for two of her daughters who were born in refugee camps. It took three years which included many hours of paper work, phone calls, the help of a judge, being on Homeland Security waiting lists for months, and a very difficult Wisconsin Vital Records employee. In spite of most people being kind and sympathetic, all agreeing that the law clearly indicated her daughters were indeed US citizens, it was all but impossible to get any of the "big four": SSN, state ID, birth certificate, and passport because all required one or two of the other documents! This experience, although not a direct equivalent, engendered an understanding of the great difficulty involved when dealing with government processes and a deep sense of compassion for those less likely to have the skills, much less the advantages she had, to obtain needed documentation.

Worship Service January 28 Becky Feyen Honoring Martin Luther King, Jr. and UUA Promise & Practice

This MLK service featured A Letter From the Birmingham Jail, in which Dr. King outlined his disappointment with the white clergy and churches of the south. The supporting resources outlined current black UU's disappointment with

our religion. What can we do to support & develop a multicultural community? All cash & specified checks were donated to Black Lives of UU (BLUU) with a matching donation from Social Action & Justice funds.
