


In Case You Missed It In March

Becky presented climate information and ideas from the Parliament of World Religions while combining several perspectives, recent topics and statistics. There have been several meetings referred to as a Parliament of the World's Religions, the first being the World's Parliament of **Religions** of 1893, which was an attempt to create a global dialogue of faiths. The event was celebrated by another conference on its centenary in 1993. This led to a new series of conferences under the official title Parliament of the World's Religions.

Worship Service March 24 Meaningful Lives with Steven Miller



Steven Miller is a visiting professor at Ripon College, where he teaches courses in philosophy and political theory. His PhD is from Southern Illinois University, where he studied American pragmatism, focusing on how communities work and how individuals develop in and through their communities.

As you might recall, Steve led classes where PLUUF's Dan Wehrwein participated as an eager student and eventually walked with Dan through his passing. Steve has written an essay about the experience, "A Lesson Before Dying" published in the Chronicle of Higher Education. A copy is available at PLUUF.

Steven's presentation on "Meaningful Lives" offered a view from the classroom. He talked about the sorts of challenges his students express in thinking of their lives as meaningful. Themes that came up during congregational sharing encompassed caring and belonging.
