### March Worship Services by Jill Stiemsma writing from El Salvador

Hello, again. Hopefully, your mysterious WI weather hasn't badly impacted Sunday service attendance. I'm so grateful for all those who step forward to lead our interesting/challenging times together. This month....

Sunday, March 10, at 10 a.m.: Jim Jaeger returns! He describes his service thusly: "In these past few months, the topic of Immigration, in the

form of a "wall" (or is it a fence, or a barrier or whatever) along our southern border with Mexico, has dominated what passes for political discourse in this country and dominated our thoughts and shut down our government for 35 days. Sunday, March 3, 10:00 a.m. – Faith, Morality and The Environment – Becky Feyen "Recent months have witnessed an evolution in public discourse on global warming. Typically discussed in the news media as a scientific, environmental or political issue, global warming is being reframed as a moral and spiritual issue by religious leaders…"

Combining several perspectives & recent topics, Becky will present climate information & ideas from the Parliament of World Religions, Yale University, Unitarian Universalism, etc. Hopefully this will provide a few new viewpoints to

inspire a different conversation around climate change. We will definitely focus on/from the "religious & moral opportunity".

Sunday, March 17, 10:00 a.m. – The Climate Crisis and What We Can Do About It – Diana Beck This presentation will examine the current scientific facts about climate change as it impacts the entire planet. The focus will also be directed to the effects in Wisconsin, using the Madison area specifically. We will address what each of us can do to help to lessen the impact of climate change.

Diana Beck is a retired teacher with the Fond du Lac School System. She is the current president of the Fond du Lac County Audubon Society and the current chair of the Fond du Lac Chapter of the Citizens Climate Lobby. The Citizens Climate Lobby is a non-partisan group with chapters all over the USA, Canada and in other countries around the world. The mission of CCL will be briefly explained.

The creativity flows when one listens to a podcast interview with Krista Tippett and Pico lyer on "The Urgency of Slowing Down." Becky Feyen coordinated this unique



A message from Jill Stiemsma: Hi, everyone. Tanya asked that I tell you a bit about my experience here in El Salvador. Most of you are included on my group email so I won't repeat. However, if you're not receiving my emails from ES but would like to, let me know: jstiemsma@icloud.com.

First of all, these three months of the year are always some of my happiest. For those of you with a teaching background, you will appreciate this: All my students volunteer to come here; they're all adults. Hence, they want to learn and have no observable behavioral problems! And - aside from quickly reviewing occasional homework with them -- I don't have ANY grading! I do write a mid-term and final exam only to determine who's ready to move to the next level and who should repeat Basic A. To date, I've never had a student disagree with my assessment! They know if they're ready to move on. It's heaven.

And then there's life in general - how I love being in Latin America: the plazas, the horrible sidewalks, the terrible traffic congestion and noise, the cat fights going on through the night, the super-friendly people, the artwork, the history, the earthquake tremors, the days without running water...but, alas, I do not like speaking Spanish. I'll never be any good at it though I keep trying. They "dollarized" ES – don't you think they could "English-size" it as well? All they'd have to do is trade one colonial language for another, for Pete's sake.

Any time you want to join me, please do. My Center is always looking for native English speakers to teach (no experience necessary). In fact, this time my good friend Ellen Swan (remember her?) is here with me - and she's enjoying it so much she's staying to teach the next cycle! Come on down!
