## Vote to Amend

Two weeks ago, a packet was sent to all members of Prairie Lakes that introduced **Wisconsin United to Amend** (wiuta.org), an organization working to overturn the Supreme Court's 2010 ruling in a case known as *Citizens United vs FEC*, which struck down as unconstitutional a federal law prohibiting corporations and unions from making expenditures in connection with federal elections. (The PAC Citizens United is a conservative 501(c)(4) nonprofit organization in the U.S. founded in 1988.)

In the enclosed letter, Judy Harris reminded us, "Commonly referred to as "Citizens United," this ruling runs contrary to our UU principles by paving the way for greed and profit-oriented power to infuse exorbitant levels of money into political campaigns, and in essence, "buy" elected officials to the detriment of workers, the environment, and minority races.

Thank you for casting your vote. Deadline to turn in the ballot is November 2. Results will appear in the December newsletter.

<u>Stay-at-home Worship Service Sunday, October 11:</u> "UU Sources of Wisdom." From the UUA Worship Website: Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote seven Principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. We live out these Principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from sources as diverse as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience. Jill Stiemsma created a stay-at-home service examining the Six Sources of Our Living Tradition that our congregations affirm and promote.


ENGAGE Sunday, October 18: "International Pronoun Day" with guest speaker Ivy Bolthouse via ZOOM. Judy Harris coordinated this presentation with technical assistance from Jim Goyette. Referring to people by the pronouns they determine for themselves is basic to human dignity. The service was published on the Prairie Lakes Facebook page on October 22 and can be viewed in its entirety.

<u>Worship Service Sunday, October 25</u>: "Who Would Kill Jesus Today?" Jill Stiemsma was inspired to create this stay-at-home service based on a five-week class on the philosophy of Marcus Borg, an influential Christian theologian and participant in the Jesus Seminar, a group of 50 biblical scholars and 100 laypeople who delved into the historical Jesus." Jill introduced the service by noting: "The Jesus Seminar essentially concluded that much of the Four Gospels reflect the evolution of his followers vs. Jesus' actual words and emphasis. This UCC class has been a tremendously informative journey that led me, eventually, to ask: "Who would kill Jesus today?"

#### Unitarian Universalist Association announces Common Read 2020-21

A Common Read invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. "Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations." In 2018 at Prairie Lakes, we read *Justice on Earth: People of Faith Working at the Intersections of Race, Class, and Environment* edited by Manish Mishra-Marzetti and Jennifer Nordstrom. Becky Feyen led two ENGAGE Sundays at Prairie Lakes to discuss the book. Last year, the UUA Common Read was "An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States for Young People."

The UUA is pleased to announce that <u>Breathe: A Letter to My Sons</u> by Imani Perry (Beacon Press, 2019) is the new Common Read.



Emotionally raw and deeply reflective, Imani Perry issues a challenge to society to see Black children as deserving of humanity. She admits fear and frustration for her African American sons in a society that is increasingly racist and at times seems irredeemable. However, as a mother, feminist, writer, and intellectual, Perry offers an unfettered expression of love—finding beauty and possibility in life—and she exhorts her children and their peers to find the courage to chart their own paths and find steady footing and inspiration in Black tradition.
