

### A Message from the Moderator by Robyn Davis-Bartow



Normally I greet people with "Happy Holidays!" or "Merry Christmas!" this time of year. Upon reflection however, "Season's Greetings" seems more appropriate. Not that I don't wish joy and well being for you all, but I want to acknowledge that this time of year may mean many different things for many people. For some it may be a time of excitement and cheer. For others a struggle that emphasizes loss or grief. Some may find it simply overwhelming while others crave more. As I look ahead at the schedule our amazing Prairie Lakes members have put together this month, I am profoundly pleased to see that the services in store reflect the complexity of the season.

As some of you know, a few weeks ago I had the opportunity to spend some time on a retreat at Dai Bosatsu, a traditional Japanese Zen Buddhist monastery in the Catskill mountains of New York. It was a profoundly intense, difficult, and beautiful experience with many insights gleaned. As a staff member on this retreat, I had a number of responsibilities such as lighting and putting out candles at the correct time, scrubbing floors, and playing a wooden drum during services. While there were many opportunities to report and receive feedback on one's mistakes, for me, the greatest lesson learned was the need to focus on the things I accomplished correctly throughout each day. If I only looked at the errors made by myself and others, I got to meditate in silence with anxiety and a spinning judgmental mind as companions. Not very pleasant! However, when focus was shifted to appreciating what worked well instead of the myriad mistakes, a sense of relaxed joy, wellbeing, and peaceful serenity filled my experience on the cushion. To summarize in the quote attributed to Voltaire, "The perfect is the enemy of the good".

During this holiday season, the practice I wish for all of us is not letting the perfect get in the way of the good. For some, family gatherings often hold challenges that strain equanimity. For others, the lack of family gatherings during this season provides another kind of challenge. Similarly, as we all know, American consumerism goes into overdrive while others go without. But much good abounds during the holidays as well. Generosity and beauty flourish. As we enter this time, let us celebrate the season as a PLUUF family, with intention to seek out the positive and bright. Season's Greetings to all.

#### A Message from UUA President Susan Frederick-Gray

This is a busy time of year for so many. Seasonally, we are in a transitional period, with possibilities for connection and celebration over the holidays, as well as experiences of grief and letting go. We are living in what I have come to call a liminal time. "Liminal" means a time in between, when what has been is no longer and what is next is not yet here.

The pandemic moved many congregations into virtual and hybrid gatherings and the ways in which people connect to religious community are changing. I can relate to that sense of liminality as I finish my last year as your UUA President and the UUA prepares to welcome a new President, to be elected by delegates at the next General Assembly (GA) in June 2023, online and in Pittsburgh, PA.

Another very significant change happening in Unitarian Universalism comes through the dedicated work of the UUA's Article II Study Commission (A2SC). Article II is the section in our UUA bylaws that contains the Purposes, 7 UU Principles and our Sources. Charged to review Article II, the Commission has held thoughtful discussions online, at General Assemblies and with groups of leaders across our Association.

This fall, the A2SC incorporated the extensive input from individuals, groups and congregations and developed an initial draft of a new Article II. You are invited to review the new draft text and share your feedback with the Commission online. Review Article II Draft

Please share this conversation in your congregation! It is so important that all of our congregations and leaders are aware of the process to renew Article II. The A2SC will submit a final draft of Article II to the UUA Board of Trustees in January 2023. Then, both the Board and congregational delegates can offer amendments to the proposal in the lead-up to GA in June. More information will be available early next year, so please begin planning your congregation's engagement in the process. The first vote on the A2SC's proposal will occur at GA.

With so much change and transition, it can be easy to feel uncertain or anxious, and we can lean on one another for support. Recognizing all the ways we are in transition, I created a sermon exploring how we embrace possibility in times of change. There is always some grief in change, because it requires letting go. Yet, there is also possibility and growth that is only possible in times of change, so there is value in learning to open our hearts to this experience.

The sermon is part of a video worship collection available through UUA WorshipWeb at <u>UUA.org/change</u>. Each video can be used on its own or together to supplement congregational worship or other programming.

Your Unitarian Universalist Association is here because of the commitment congregations have made to each other to support a broader Association that can amplify and strengthen our shared values, support congregations and leaders in times of need, and be more than any of us can be on our own. We are committed, steadfast partners with you in this liminal time and in all that is ahead.
