This service will look more deeply into what makes a place spiritual, how to recognize or nurture those

2nd Annual Jean Johnson Paddle & Picnic Adventure Recap




NEEDED: Baked goods for Ripon College Students

Recipe by Request: Lilly & Caebrie's Chocolate Chip Cookie Recipe

Although it wasn't a second Sunday potluck at the Celebrate the Harvest event, Lilly Buchanan-Beegle and her friend Caebrie baked and served mind blowing chocolate chip cookies. The recipe is shared below:

2 ¼ cups flour
½ tsp baking soda
½ tsp baking powder
1 tsp salt
1 cup vegetable shortening
(or 2 sticks melted butter)
1 cup + 3 tbsp brown sugar
¼ cup + 2 tbsp granulated sugar
1 tsp vanilla
1 tbsp honey
4 yolks
Bag of chocolate chips

Combine flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt and set aside. In a separate bowl, mix together vegetable shortening (or melted butter) with brown sugar, granulated sugar, vanilla, honey then add yolks. Mix in the dry ingredients slowly. Stir in chocolate chips. Place in the fridge for a couple hours. Drop onto ungreased baking sheet by rounded tablespoon and bake at 325 degrees for about 9 minutes.
