General Assembly 2024

The 63rd General Assembly will take place virtually Thursday, June 20 through Sunday, June 23, 2024. General Assembly is the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists, where we conduct business of the Association, explore the theological underpinnings of our faith, and lean fully into our mission and principles. (Note: Prairie Lakes has been a member of the UUA for over 30 years).

Theme: Love Unites, Stories Ignite: In a world filled with division and challenges, the theme for this year's General Assembly is a powerful reminder of the core principles that unite us as Unitarian Universalists. "Love Unites, Stories Ignite" celebrates the profound impact of love as a binding force that transcends boundaries and fosters connections within our faith community and beyond.

Proposed Article II will be voted on at the June 2024 General Assembly Meeting

On August 20 & October 1 of 2023, Becky Feyen led two ENGAGE Sundays focused on the proposed changes to the UUA Bylaws. She explained the proposed change and provided handouts that are available at PLUUF.

The proposed change will go from this:

- Honor the inherent worth and dignity of every person.
- Practice justice, equity, and compassion in human relations.
- Accept one another and encourage spiritual growth.
- 4. Support the freedom to search for what is true and right in life.
- 5. Ensure all have a vote about matters that concern them.
- Work for a peaceful, fair, and free world.
- 7. Care for planet Earth, the home we share with all living things.

To this:

Why change Article II now?

Our seven Principles and six Sources – which we know and love – were adopted in 1985. They offered a substantial (even radical) change from what preceded them. The changes came through years of effort by UU women, particularly the UU Women's Federation, to push for gender equality in UUism, support for women in the ministry and to eliminate sexist language from our bylaws, hymns, and yes, from the version of Article II passed in 1961 (at the time of merger).

But the changes didn't just address gender, they made significant language changes that reflected the times. It removed language of God, man, and brotherhood, but also added the language of interdependence and added sources reflecting the growing theological diversity shaping our tradition.

Today, the digital age has shifted our interactions with community and truth. The COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted our interdependence, and where individualism falls short. There is a rise in global autocracies and attacks on democratic institutions, and climate catastrophe and mass extinctions threaten the delicate balance of the web of life. These are just a few of the major struggles our living tradition must face today and in our future. With the articulation of our shared UU values, we can be better equipped to make values based decisions in facing these new and evolving realities.

Why did the proposal do away with the word "principles?" If this passes, what happens to the principles?

The Commission spent a long time studying and analyzing the current version of Article II. What became clear was that we don't explicitly name the values that we share, and that our covenant does not have enough verbs.

Shared values are what hold any organization together, and we often speak of our shared values without naming them. We (the UUA Study Commission) asked Unitarian Universalists what were the values we shared. We took the many answers we received and synthesized them into the values in our draft. After our first draft was released we changed one of the named values from Evolution to Transformation.

We created a covenant related to each of our named values, as well as a very brief description of the values. The covenant has many verbs and is stated in broad enough language so as to allow congregations to find their way to live into our shared values.

If the revision of Article II is adopted as currently written, the UUA Principles will no longer be incorporated in the UUA bylaws. We anticipate congregations and individuals will continue to utilize the UUA Principles alongside the newly articulated shared UUA Values, as previous covenants and statements of commonly held beliefs are used within their historical context today.
