PLUUF has been a special part of my life in Ripon. I appreciate that it is open to diverse outlooks, and encourages the spiritual journey.


Back by Popular Demand: Summer Youth Group Activities

- Family Day at Pollock Community Water Park (Oshkosh)



ENGAGE Sunday, April 7, <u>Banning, Challenging, and Censoring</u> <u>Books</u> with Mika Chetto

Mika is the Educational Technology and Library Media Specialist in the Green Lake School District. Book bans & challenges in schools and public libraries reached a record high in 2023. Are there ever good reasons to ban a book? Mika helped us understand what it means to ban or challenge a book, the main 'reasons' a book gets banned, who the people are that most frequently ban books, and what we can do if a book is banned or challenged in our libraries. Worship Service Sunday, April 14, <u>Why Endangered Species Matter -</u> <u>The Last Ones</u> presented by Brad Roost

In honor of Earth Day (April 22, 2024) Brad presented the impact of the Endangered Species Act on preserving both species and their habitats. Despite facing criticism and political challenges, the Act remains a crucial tool in safeguarding biodiversity, highlighting the delicate balance between human development and the conservation of natural habitats essential for all life forms to thrive. Our 7th Principle of the "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part" made this a critical topic to address.



ENGAGE Sunday, April 21,<u>*The Spiritual Solution to Addiction*</u> with **Christopher Stoye** By sharing his experience, strength and hope using a 12-step program, Christopher demonstrated that there is a daily reprieve from addiction based on a renewed spiritual condition. Chris said, "I can open others to enrichment through miraculous spiritual growth in fellowship with Unitarian Universalism."

Stoye is a new member of PLUUF and new to the Ripon area having lived in Detroit, New York, Chicago, and Milwaukee prior to relocating. He has spent most of his professional life as a chef working in high stress and fast paced environments. He has also struggled with addictions since his teens. He has been clean and sober for the past 10 years and he works daily on his motivation

to stay sober through spiritual connection with his higher power.
