


ENGAGE Sunday, July 7, 10AM <u>Can We Share Moral Principles With Other</u>

**ENGAGE Sunday, July 21, 10AM** *El Salvador: Pathway to Facism* with Jill Stiemsma As you may know, Jill teaches English in El Salvador every January to March. Consequently, she is a first-hand witness to El Salvador's turn to fascism and all that entails. Learn about this new war against the poor...and what it may portend for the US.



**Romero:** A play representing the official start of the Salvadoran Civil War In the era of growing support for Liberation Theology, Salvadoran Archbishop Oscar Romero stood as the vanguard between El Salvador's tortured and starved rural poor and its military regime and the United States who weaponized the country in the name of fighting communism. Experience the heat of the battle in a play Jill Stiemsma wrote based entirely on the book Monseñor Romero by María López Vigil. You are invited into the heart, mind and soul of a brilliant leader who struggled to become the voice of the peasants in El Salvador and who was subsequently martyred for his faith. The play allows the story to unfold

through the voices of friends and enemies alike who deliver their side of history in vignettes.

# Connie Ghinazzi Attended the All-Virtual General Assembly: The Unitarian Universalist Association's Annual Meeting

After a democratic process involving thousands of Unitarian Universalists discussing the faith's values and core theology over the past three-plus years, delegates at General Assembly 2024 voted decisively to approve <u>a new statement of values and beliefs for Unitarian Universalism</u>.

With love centered as a core value of Unitarian Universalism, PLUUF's new Moderator Connie Ghinazzi joined more than 3,400 Unitarian Universalists from around the country and world for an all-virtual Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly 2024, June 20-23.

The new statement of values, which passed with 80% support, is the first wholesale revision of Article II, the Unitarian Universalist covenant clause, since 1987 and reflects over three years of feedback and discussions with thousands of Unitarian Universalists.

Love at the Center: New UU Statement of Values Passes after Momentous General Assembly Delegate Vote The years-long democratic process culminated with debate and the GA vote. A two-thirds majority was required for approval.

At the annual General Assembly, Unitarian Universalists voted for a new statement of values and affirmed our commitment to issues around climate change; to the inclusion of transgender, nonbinary and intersex people; to addressing the effects of COVID-19; and to solidarity with Palestinians, as well as Israeli hostages.

The new version of Article II contains six interconnected values: equity, generosity, interdependence, justice, pluralism and transformation, which all surround love in a "shared values flower." Each value is accompanied by multiple sentences that describe how Unitarian Universalists intend to uphold their covenant, replacing the previous set of 7 principles.

# In Memory of Rev. Jim & Karen Jaeger by Tanya Schwartz-Roeper



A beautiful memorial service celebrating Jim Jaeger's life was held on June 22, 2024, at First Unitarian Universalist Society in Madison, WI. He passed away on May 16, 2024, after a six-year battle with Lewy Body dementia.

Prairie Lakes was fortunate to have Jim as our quarter-time Consulting Contract Minister from September 1, 2013 – June 30, 2016. Not only did Jim lead 2nd Sunday Worship Services at Prairie Lakes, he led Adult Religious Education sessions, attended PLUUF Board meetings, and provided care and comfort to a couple of PLUUF members battling serious health issues at the time.

His wife Karen preceded him in death. Karen often accompanied Jim on his trips from Madison to Prairie Lakes. She passed on June 1, 2022 after a year long fight against cancer.

Jim started his career working as a lawyer for the IRS. In the early 1980s Jim left the IRS and the whole family moved to Madison, WI, where he helped pioneer the field of Elder Law and was an early adopter of the use of technology in law practices.

Jim always had a calling to the ministry and realized that calling when he was ordained as a Unitarian Universalist Minister in 2016. Several members of Prairie Lakes attended his ordination ceremony in Madison. He loved serving several small UU churches in Southern Wisconsin and working as a Hospice Chaplain after he retired from his law practice.

Travis Nygard shared information about the language and identities of LGBT+ people in America. We explored how the words that people used to think about themselves have evolved over the past century and continue to change today. He led a discussion with the fellowship about the power of words for this community and what we have noticed about them in our lifetimes.



ENGAGE Sunday, June 16: <u>The 7 Principles of Maryam's Spirituality</u> presented by Ray Gurney with assistance from Pat Dobrinska

The 7 Principles of Unitarian Universalism were used as a general guide to spirituality for this discussion. In a workshop format, seven sayings of Maryam were analyzed in light of the 7 principles. This illuminated two elements: 1. The usefulness of the 7 Principles in driving discussions of

spirituality, and 2. the depth and breadth of Maryam's personal spirituality.



Worship Service Sunday, June 23, 10AM: <u>Allyship is Faith in Action</u> presented by Becky Feyen

As UU's our First Principle proclaims, the inherent worth & dignity of every person. How do we put that belief into action? Becky proposed that being an ally for the marginalized &/or maligned is one of our highest callings. Allyship does not require huge actions; rather the daily listening & acknowledgement of those who are ignored, belittled, or harmed because of their beliefs, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, race, disability, age, etc. She described that the list is long & there is much we can do to learn & support each other.
