### In Case You Missed it in December



**ENGAGE Sunday, December 1,** *After the Election: Exploring Paths Forward* **with Dr. Paul Jeffries.** The discussion centered on reactions to the recent election, highlighting the diverse responses, including jubilation among President Trump supporters and deep despair among others. Key concerns included the potential resurrection of misogyny and racism. The conversation also touched on the need for justice, equity, and compassion, advocating for marginalized groups and engaging in courageous compassion. Historical precedents and the role of the Unitarian Universalist 7 principles were discussed as potential guides for moving forward.



Worship Service Sunday, December 8, Plus Potluck & Children's RE *Embracing Possibility in Times of Change* with Connie Ghinazzi. This service was based on one published with videos on the Worship Web UU website. Although created as a remote service in November 2022, the topic was very appropriate for our current world situation.

Worship Service Sunday, December 22, 10:00 AM Spiral Walk & Music A morning of music with Jill Stiemsma and a Spiral Walk with Robyn Davis-Bartow. During the Spiral Walk, we celebrated the turning point in the year when the days become their shortest and the night its longest, and we looked for the light which comes from within. PLUUF's flaming chalice was in the center of the spiral. Each participant walked the spiral alone to the center of the spiral, where they lit their own candle to place along the spiral.



**5th Sunday, December 29:** *Spirituality Through Literature & History* with Kathryn Severson. To continue this month's celebration of music and acknowledge the celebration of Kwanzaa by some community members this week, Kathryn Severson presented "Transporting Through Music" a brief historical overview of the impact of spirituals on the African American experience. Inspired by a short passage from the *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass, an American Slave* (1845) in which Douglass observes, "I've often been utterly astonished, since I came to the north, to find persons who could speak of the singing, among slaves, as evidence of their contentment and happiness. It is impossible to

conceive of a greater mistake. Slaves sing most when they are most unhappy. The songs of the slave represent the sorrows of his heart; and he is relieved by them, only as an aching heart is relieved by its tears." The impact of spiritual music on the human ability to transport mind, body, and spirit has a strong history in the African American experience. We looked briefly at the periods of slavery and reconstruction, the rebirth of the Harlem Renaissance, and the Civil Rights Era post World War II to trace musical expression of the themes of Hope, Pride, and Despair.
