

Webster Grant Awarded to Prairie Lakes

Prairie Lakes applied for and received a Grant from the Webster Foundation in the amount of \$1,500! At the UUA General Assembly in June 2024, UUs voted to replace existing Seven Principles and Six Sources language in the UUA bylaws with language describing Unitarian Universalism through these shared values: Interdependence - Pluralism - Justice - Transformation - Generosity - Equity. Not everyone at Prairie Lakes was comfortable with this change and Rev. ENGAGE Sunday, February 16, with Sherman Leatherberry & Pat Dobrinska "Inner Worlds Outer Worlds Outer Worlds Part II - The Spiral" "Inner Worlds Outer Worlds" Part 2 delved deeper into the concept that our inner reality is interconnected with the outer universe, exploring the idea of a unified field of energy that connects all things through vibrant visuals and scientific explanations, suggesting that by accessing this inner realm through meditation and mindfulness, we can tap into a deeper understanding of ourselves and the cosmos around us; it highlighted the historical figures who may have accessed this knowledge, emphasizing the potential for healing and spiritual growth through this connection. After viewing the video, discussion delved into the nature of gravity, the limitations of analytical thinking, the importance of patterns, and the spiritual implications of natural phenomena, and much more.



Worship Service Sunday, February 23, 10AM with Jill Stiemsma "Finding Hope in an Absurd Time. Jill resurrected a Valentine's service entitled "Finding Hope in an Absurd Time," a stay-at-home service she wrote for PLUUF attendees during the Pandemic. The service offered a message of hope from John Lewis, whose very life was seriously threatened in the Civil Rights marches, and from the Dalai Lama and Archbishop Desmond's own debilitating experiences as discussed in The Book of Joy, which some PLUUF members examined in an ENGAGE Sunday years back. Their messages are as potent today as when they were spoken long before this last election.
